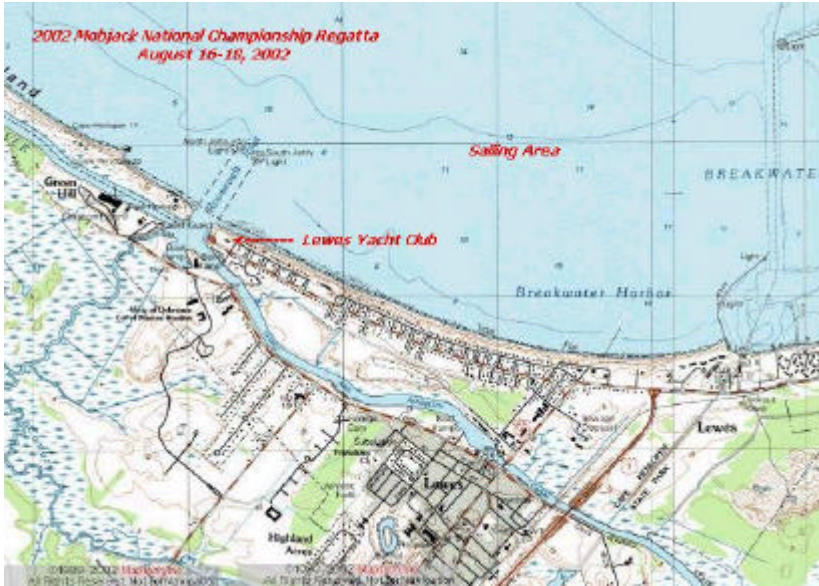

Invite entries to the
2002 MOBJACK NATIONALS
to be sailed on the Delaware Bay at Lewes, Delaware, USA

The regatta will be held to determine the champion of the entire Mobjack Class for 2002.

This will be a five race series at an excellent sailing venue and an opportunity to celebrate the birthdays of several class Masters, two on their home turf.

The Racing Rules of Sailing 2001-2004 from the International Sailing Federation, as modified by the United States Sailing Association, the Mobjack Class Racing Rules and Race Committee Sailing instructions shall apply.

This regatta is restricted to boats of the Mobjack Class. A Mobjack is eligible to race and is considered in the Mobjack Class only if it is registered to and is owned by or chartered by an active or isolated member in good standing, or by a syndicate or club. The boat must conform in all respects to the Mobjack Class Specifications.

Skippers must be active or isolated members in good standing. In the interest of promoting the Mobjack Class, a member in good standing may designate an associate member or an individual from outside the class to be skipper of his boat. Other restrictions apply: see the International Mobjack Association Constitution and By-Laws for additional details.

Competitors are required to complete, sign and return the enclosed registration form before the skippers meeting on August 16, 2002. Paid registrations received by August 1, 2002 are eligible for a discount.

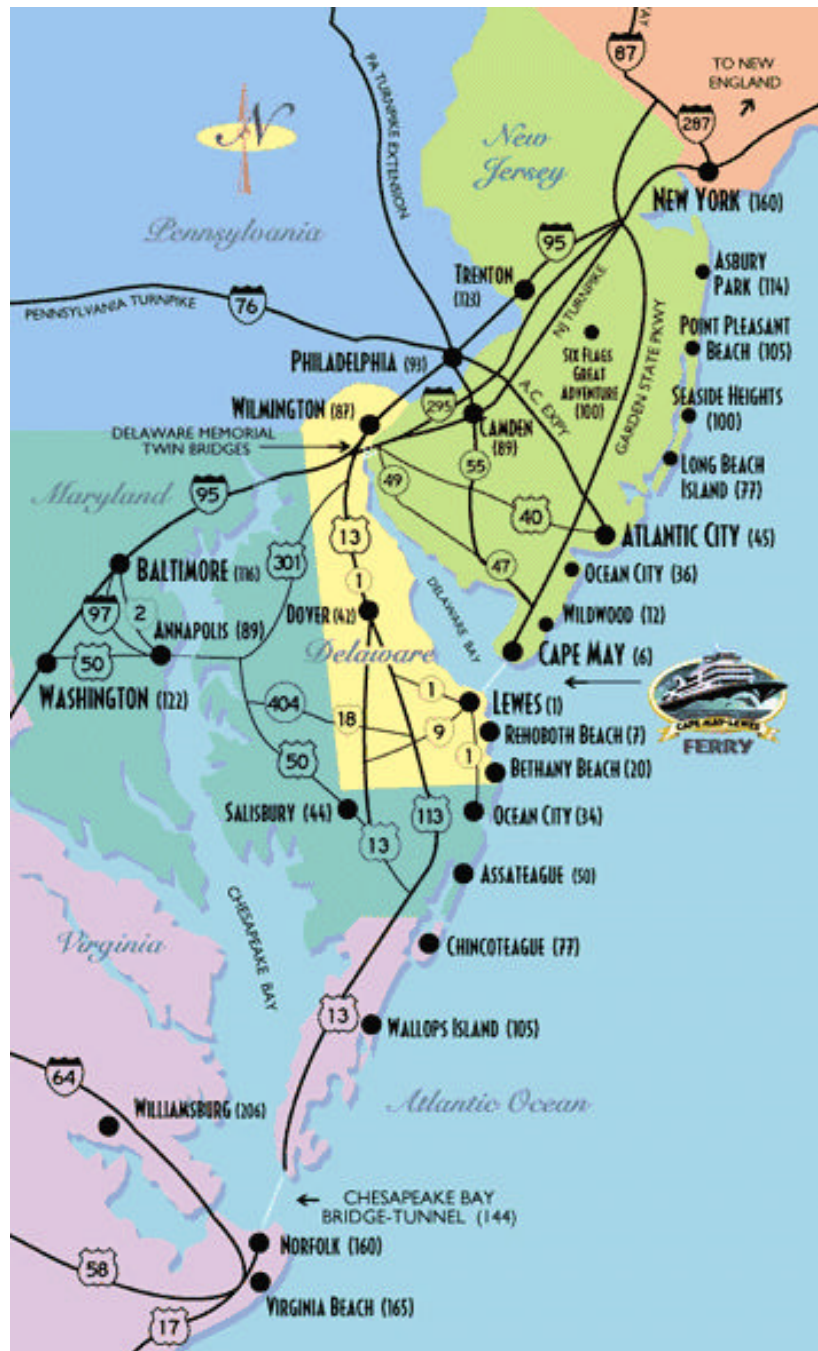

Directions:

The Lewes Yacht Club is located at the west end of Cedar Street between the Lewes Beach and the Lewes Rehoboth Canal right before Roosevelt Inlet. Follow the directions below.

Rehoboth Beach is South down US HWY 1. Visit <http://www.dmv.com/> to view maps of the area, and to learn about many of the restaurants, shops, hotels, inns, and bed and breakfasts in the Lewes/Rehoboth area. There is also Cape Henlopen State Park located in just east of Lewes. The Cape May-Lewes Ferry is immediately to the east of Lewes. See the attractions section below for additional local-area information.

East to Route 18 East; in Georgetown, Delaware, take Route 9 East

Easton, MD, take Route 331 South from Easton to Route 318 East; Routes 331 and 318 will intersect, follow 318

Baltimore, MD, take Route 97 South to Route 50 East over the William Preston Lake Jr. Memorial Bridge to Route 404 East to Georgetown, Delaware, to Route 9 East

Washington, DC, take Route 495 North/South around city to Route 50 East, then follow Baltimore directions

Williamsburg, VA, take Route 64 East to Route 13 North and the Chesapeake Bay Bridge Tunnel (toll) to Route 113 North (after merge of Routes 113 and 13) to Route 24 East to Route 1 North to Route 9 East

Norfolk/Virginia Beach, VA, follow Williamsburg directions from Route 13 North

Family Attractions for Racers and Non-Racers:

Beaches

Some of the finest beaches on the eastern coast can be found in Lewes. There are lovely beaches along the Delaware Bay shoreline that are quiet and great for the family as well as the oceanfront beaches at Cape Henlopen State Park that provide excitement for the more adventurous.

Cape Henlopen State Park

One mile east of Lewes where the Atlantic Ocean and the Delaware Bay meet (302) 645-8983

The largest of Delaware's State Parks, Cape Henlopen's almost 4,000 acres of sandy peninsula is one of the area's main attractions for young and old alike. Swimmers, surf fishermen, and birders can enjoy long hours spent on the shore of the Atlantic Ocean and Delaware Bay. Other recreational activities may be pursued at the tennis and basketball courts, hockey and softball fields, nature trails, Frisbee golf course, Seaside Nature Center, fishing pier, and observation tower. Programs and activities for all ages are offered. Campsites are available on a first-come basis. Come to camp, fish, hike, swim, crab and enjoy nature.

Walking Tour of Historical Lewes

With history dating back to 1631, it is not surprising that Lewes has many homes of both historical and architectural significance. Many colonial structures have survived the Atlantic storms and the battles with the British. Nineteenth-century homes are plentiful, and the town's Victorian era is also evident. History buffs will also find a bountiful treasure. Lewes is rich in Colonial and Victorian history, and local churchyards offer weathered headstones to document the last three centuries. A walking tour guide is available free of charge at many local businesses, museums and the Chamber of Commerce.

Sights of Interest

Colonel David Hall House

107 Kings Highway

This early 18th century cypress-shingled house is mentioned in the 1734 will of Nathaniel Hall, but is named after his more famous grandson, Colonel David Hall, a lawyer, revolutionary soldier and judge who was elected the 15th Governor of Delaware in 1802. The interior of the house contains original woodwork, paneling and plaster ornamentation.

deVries Monument and Fort Site

Pilottown Road

On this site in 1631, Dutch settlers under the direction of deVries established the whaling colony of Zwaanendael and erected a fort. The following spring, Indians burned the fort and massacred the settlers. In 1964 members of the Sussex Society of Archaeology and History found the postmold patterns of the south bastion as sketched by deVries, culminating the years of effort to determine the exact location of the fort. A monument stands to honor the significance of the first brief settlement.

Fisher Martin House

120 Kings Highway

Circa 1730, this charming gambrel-roofed house was moved from the country at Coolspring in 1980 as part of the celebration of the 350th anniversary of the first European settlement on Delaware soil. The building is now used as a focal point for community activities and exhibits. The Lewes Chamber of Commerce information center is located in the house.

The Lightship Overfalls

Pilottown Road (on Canal Front)

In 1973 the U.S. Coast Guard donated to the Lewes Historical Society one of the last lightships which functioned on the East Coast. Once in Lewes it was rechristened the Overfalls, for the lightship which patrolled the entrance to the Delaware Bay from 1892 to 1961. It now has a permanent berth and houses a historical museum.

1812 Memorial Park

Front Street

This was a defense battery during the War of 1812, and the site is marked by a granite monument placed by the National Society, U.S. Daughters of 1812. Several naval guns are also on display, including a three-inch gun used during World War I.

Ryves Holt House

Second and Mulberry Streets

This dignified shingled house is believed to be the oldest house still standing in the state. It is known to have been standing in 1685 and recent wood analysis dates it to 1665. Once a colonial inn, it became home to Ryves Holt in 1721 when he arrived at "Port Lewes." Holt later became the Naval Officer of the Port, High Sheriff of Sussex County, and Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of the Three Lower Counties on the Delaware.

Shipcarpenter Square

Shipcarpenter and Third Streets

This private residential community is a tribute to historical preservation. Of the 30 homes currently located in this 11-acre area, 28 were moved from their original locations in Delaware, all within a 40-mile radius of Lewes. All the homes had

been abandoned or were in a state of disrepair, but each has been tastefully restored to its original splendor, some with modern additions. The development will eventually include 35 historic homes, and all were built between 1720 and 1880, spanning Colonial, Federal and Victorian styles of architecture.

Zwaanendael Museum

Savannah Road & Kings Highway

Built in 1931 in memory of the ill-fated Dutch settlement of 1631, this adaptation of the old Stathius (City Hall) in Hoorn, the Netherlands, houses permanent and changing displays and exhibits dealing with the history of Lewes and Delaware, as well as Dutch gifts and exhibits.

Admission: Admission is free, donations are accepted

Hours: Tuesday-Saturday 10am-4:30pm, Sunday 1:30-4:30pm

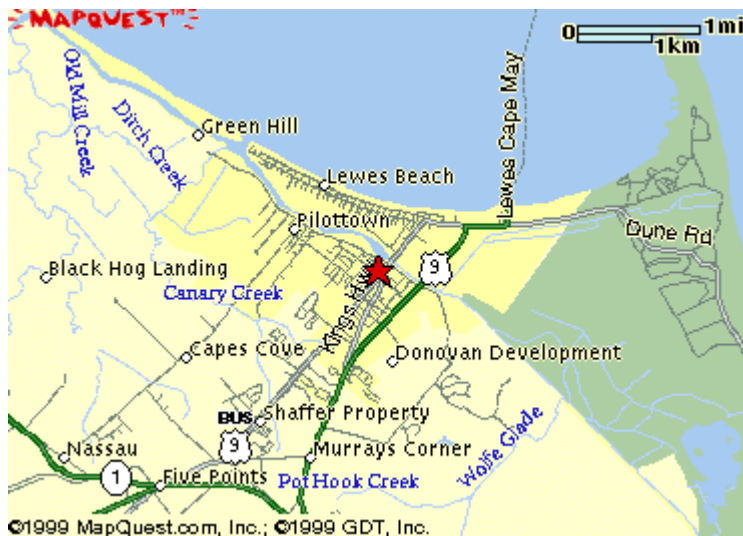
Lewes Historical Society Complex

The complex includes a variety of restored historical sites open to the public. Tours and special events are held throughout the year. Sites include the restored and stocked **Thompson Country Store**, built around 1800 and operated continuously until 1962; **The Cannonball House**, erected prior to 1797 and struck by a British cannonball during the War of 1812, it now contains the **Marine Museum** with expanding nautical exhibits; the **Rabbit's Ferry House**, an early-eighteenth century one-room farmhouse with an addition that was constructed several decades later, both sections containing original material such as cypress shingles, door trim, mantle and paneling; and the **Hiram Burton House**, former home of Dr. Hiram Rodney Burton, Lewes physician and two-term U.S. Congressman, containing a Reading Room for those interested in reading Delaware history.

Admission: Adults \$5, children admitted free

Hours: Mid-June to Labor Day open Tuesday-Friday 10am-3pm, Saturday 10am-12:30pm
